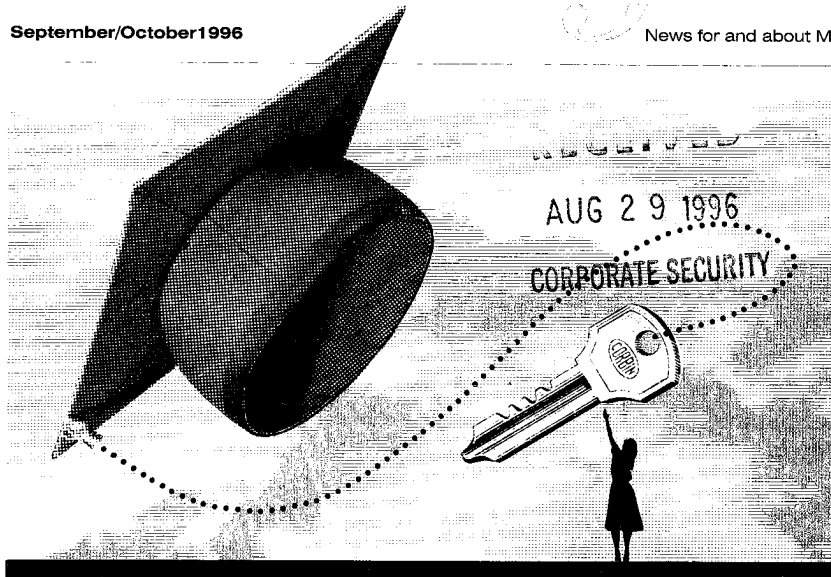

Webster Master's Now at Nine U.S. Sites

WEBSTER UNIVERSITY, in conjunction with ASIS, currently offers a master's degree in security management at nine sites across the United States. Although the master's degree program is not offered by correspondence, Webster has nearly sixty graduate centers worldwide, providing the flexibility to begin a security management degree program where interest is high.

"A degree program can be formed in any urban area where Webster has a graduate center and there is ASIS chapter demand," says Sandy Davidson, ASIS director of research and development. "Sufficient demand would be a group of fifteen individuals with bachelor's degrees who commit to enrolling and

matriculating together."

Webster University, based in St. Louis, was established in 1915. It is an independent, multi-campus, international university featuring both graduate and undergraduate programs in liberal arts, fine and performing arts, teacher education, business, and management. "When someone in the field of security thinks of graduate studies," Davidson explains, "Webster is the first school that comes to mind."

All Webster programs are taught in the classroom by adjunct faculty members with relevant experience as security practitioners. Many Webster adjunct professors are ASIS members. Most classes are conducted at night at local Webster University graduate centers for *continued on page 4*

Noggle Endowment Named

THE NORTH TEXAS Chapter has officially recognized the substantial achievement of long-time member Dennis Noggle by naming its scholarship endowment after the former chapter chairman. Noggle, who died June 18 after a battle with cancer, was executive director of corporate security for the Kimberly-Clark Corporation. *ASIS Dynamics* spoke with Noggle a week prior to his death about the endowment fund and his career in security.

"I was very surprised by the honor," said Noggle, a twenty-eight year ASIS member and a ten-year member of the North Texas Chapter. "I know it took a lot of people voting to make that happen and that made me feel proud."

According to Randy Jordan, current chapter chairman, Noggle was more than deserving of the honor. Jordan explains that the decision was made by the chapter to name the fund The Dennis Noggle Leadership Endowment because of Noggle's continually active and supportive role in chapter affairs and his commitment to the security profession.

"Dennis was very intense and very involved in security and maintaining it as a professional field," Jordan says. "He acted as the chapter *continued on page 5*
